Dear Federated Friends,

As you read in this newsletter in May, my Study Leave theme was "intentional ecumenical communities." The word "ecumenical" describes any group made up of more than one Christian tradition.

I visited communities that, like Federated Church, have made a commitment to be made up of more than one Christian denomination (and sometimes more than one religious faith).

Intentional ecumenical communities are not typical, but those of us from Federated Church are used to being ecumenical. We do not think being ecumenical is strange, but it could be easy, in this day and age, to feel that intentional ecumenical communities are *radical*.

Why do I say this? I say this because it seems to be more and more rare to find people talking about what we as human beings have in common. We are quicker to name what makes us different from one another. Think about what you read about in the news these days:

- Muslims verses Christians and Jews
- Immigrants verses Citizens
- Police verses African-Americans
- Democrats verses Republicans
- Cities verses Rural Areas
- Environment verses Business

Within our own congregation of Federated Church, disagreements and disputes in the past have found folks

continues on page 2 —> taking "sides" using our two denominations, Congregational/United Church of Christ "verses" Presbyterian.

The time is now for Christians to be very, very careful to <u>not let</u> <u>ourselves forget our commonalities</u>. When I recall the life of Jesus — amid all of the easy ways it is to pick a side in the many X verses Y issues of our day — it is Jesus' life that makes me more careful AND keeps me mindful of what all God's creatures have in common.

I recently watched a video made by two African-American police officers who have formed a board for ethical police behavior. It made me think about how Jesus and the Roman centurion talked to one another in the Gospel according to Matthew chapter 8. Jesus was an ethnic minority, and the centurion was militarized police of the Roman empire, but they found common ground.

In June, I was welcomed to a Muslim Ramadan meal that was organized by the Minnesota Council of Churches. At the meal, and since then, I have thought about Jesus talking with the Syrophoenecian woman in the Gospel according to Mark chapter 7. At first, Jesus called her a dog, but then she showed her compassion, and he reflected her compassion back to her.

Prior to becoming a minister, nearly all of my professional work was in jobs that required me to be bilingual in Spanish and to work with Hispanic immigrants. I think of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph as refugees in Egypt — in other words, Jesus was taken "illegally" to a foreign country as an infant — and how do we hope the Egyptians treated him and his parents? What about immigrant families today?

I grew up in a small city in a mostly rural state, then I lived in a couple of big cities in mostly rural states, and now I live in a big town of a mostly rural state. I think of Jesus in rural areas, and then he went into small towns, and then into the big city of Jerusalem. He went into Samaria in the Gospel according to John chapter 4, which was an area where traditional Jews didn't go because of differences in Samarian Jewish and traditional Jewish practices. Whether Jesus was in a rural area, a town, or a city, everyone in all places had struggles within themselves and struggles with one another.

Federated is a special church because of its combined ecumenical heritage in both the Congregational/UCC and Presbyterian traditions. Our two traditions are like fraternal twins — we have the same parentage, with unique characteristics. This is true throughout all of God's creation and all of God's creatures. Let us not forget our commonalities. As Christians, we have our differences and our commonalities to celebrate. See you in church,

Women's Fellowship in Transition Submitted by Linda Wheatley

Women's Fellowship has been around for a long time. But maybe it's time for that to end. The official "mission" of Women's Fellowship has been to foster and encourage Christian fellowship and spiritual growth among the women of the church, to support the church and to provide outreach to those in need locally and around the world.

So what does that look like? Christian fellowship and spiritual growth happens through small groups (Circles, Needlepoint Ministry) and larger groups events—although those larger groups events—meetings, programs and dinners—aren't very large because attendance has declined in recent years. Providing outreach includes fund raising which is done through the annual all church garage and bake sale, "Cookies 'N More", and circle donations and then distributing the funds raised to local, national and international charities.

Support for the church includes organizing the funeral committees who prepare and serve funeral meals; monitoring the kitchen to keep supplies (such as coffee, paper products, etc.) available and conducting an annual kitchen clean-up day, and maintaining the church library and reading program.

Community outreach projects include delivering Meals on Wheels, donating cookies for the Bloodmobile, assisting with Bingo at skilled care centers and helping serve Lenten Lunches.

The problem with Women's Fellowship is finding people to step up and assume leadership roles. The women who have been serving in those leadership roles have done it for a very long time. For various reasons they have indicated they will not continue in 2018.

The current leadership board could be reduced in size and function. People who have not been active before could decide to participate. Maybe it's all of those things. Maybe it's none. Maybe it's time for Women's Fellowship to disband. Maybe you have some ideas about that. Share your ideas. 
