#### **PASTOR'S REPORT**

Since our church belongs to two denominations, there are plenty of opportunities to learn. As a Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) ordained minister, I still have much to learn about the United Church of Christ. I have wondered why the UCC does not have an extensive set of creeds; whereas the PC(USA) has the Book of Confessions, which includes 12 creeds.

One reason why the UCC does not have an "official theology" is the denomination's emphasis on congregational autonomy. The UCC Constitution insures the rights of each local church to "formulate its own covenants and confessions of faith..." (Article IV, paragraph 15).

I have also learned that the UCC has a particular approach to theology. Some denominations begin with formulated beliefs and then interpret life situations with those beliefs. Other denominations tend to begin with life situations and then move toward developing beliefs. According to one denominational resource, the UCC is more of the latter: "In the United Church of Christ, we work toward gaining a theological understanding of the situation in which we find ourselves." ("Theology in the UCC" by Parish Life and Leadership Ministry Team of Local Church Ministries).

While the UCC does not have an extensive set of beliefs, it does have a concise "Statement of Faith" which was developed in 1959 (two years after the formation of the UCC). I appreciate the following description of the statement's purpose: "Rather than being a test of faith, [UCC Statement of Faith] is a testimony of faith which informs, instructs and inspires the members, groups and organizations of the United Church of Christ." Below is the 1979 updated version of the Statement of Faith by then UCC President, Robert V. Moss. As you read it, consider the following questions:

Which parts of the statement stood out to you?

Which parts of the statement would you strongly agree with?

Are there parts of the statement that you disagree with (or have uncertainty with)?

How does this statement help you in your understanding of God?

#### United Church of Christ Statement of Faith—adapted by Robert V. Moss

We believe in God, the Eternal Spirit, who is made known to us in Jesus our brother, and to whose deeds we testify:

God calls the worlds into being, creates humankind in the divine image, and sets before us the ways of life and death.

God seeks in holy love to save all people from aimlessness and sin.

God judges all humanity and all nations by that will of righteousness declared through prophets and apostles.

In Jesus Christ, the man of Nazareth, our crucified and risen Lord, God has come to

us and shared our common lot, conquering sin and death and reconciling the whole creation to its Creator.

God bestows upon us the Holy Spirit, creating and renewing the church of Jesus Christ, binding in covenant faithful people of all ages, tongues, and races.

God calls us into the church to accept the cost and joy of discipleship, to be servants in the service of the whole human family, to proclaim the gospel to all the world and resist the powers of evil, to share in Christ's baptism and eat at his table, to join him in his passion and victory.

God promises to all who trust in the gospel forgiveness of sins and fullness of grace, courage in the struggle for justice and peace, the presence of the Holy Spirit in trial and rejoicing, and eternal life in that kingdom which has no end.

Blessing and honor, glory and power be unto God.

# **DECODING THE LITURGICAL COLOR SCHEME**

Within the life of the church, color has long been used to give a visual indicator of what is happening in the life of the church. Whether it is marking of the rhythm and movement of the liturgical season, or the noting of a special celebration within the life of the church , the colors that we use in worship, whether it is in the cloths covering the tables or the stoles that the Pastor and the choir wears, have deep meaning.

White = Holiness We use white any time we are celebrating days that emphasize the divinity of Christ: Christmas, Easter, Baptism of the Lord, Christ the King, and so on. For the most part, if you find white paraments in the sanctuary, you are worshiping on a day that has great significance to our understanding of Jesus as God. Also, since white has come to symbolize holiness, it is also often used for the celebration of both sacraments (baptism and communion). You will also often see a pastor wear a white stole when officiating a wedding. Although there is no theological or liturgical reason, some pastors choose to do so as the colors white and black are so often associated with weddings. However, any color stole is deemed appropriate based on the season.

**Purple = Preparation** Purple is the color that is used during our season of preparation: Advent and Lent. During both of these seasons (the four Sundays before Christmas and the 40 Days before Easter, respectively), we are to dedicate ourselves for the preparation of our hearts and minds for welcoming Christ.

Purple is also the traditional color of royalty, and so some give not to this as a reason why we use purple during these seasons.

In some tradition, the color blue is used interchangeably with purple during the season of Advent.

In March, the vestment colors will be **purple** until March 28th, Maundy Thursday, where it changes to **white**. The paraments will stay white through the Sundays of Easter until May 19th, the Day of Pentecost, where red will be the color.




