#### From the Pastor's Desk

#### How Do You Connect with God?

That was the take-away question from a workshop led by Rev. Dr. Candace Adams at this year's Pastoral Leadership Revitalization (PLR) pastors' retreat sponsored by the Omaha Presbyterian Seminary Foundation.

We tend to think that there are just a few ways in which we connect with God; whether it reading the Bible or closing our eyes to pray. Yet, as Rev. Adams pointed out, that would be a narrow understanding of spirituality. She compared it to a doctor who prescribes penicillin as a cure-all of their patient rather than utilizing a more specialized treatment.

In her work as a spiritual wellness practitioner, Candace helps people to find their God-given way of connecting with the Divine. To our group of about 20 pastors (from Homestead and Missouri River Valley Presbyteries), she presented eleven distinct ways in which people connect with God. The first nine are from Gary Thomas' book, Sacred Pathways.

Here are summaries of Thomas' nine spiritual pathways from his website,

> **Naturalists** are those believers whose hearts best soar toward God when they get outside and are surrounded by all that He has made. There's something about being surrounded by God's creation, the beauty of nature, that bends them toward worship and adoration... If you find that you can't sit still at your desk without falling



asleep; or that you're bored by trying to comb through devotional books while lying on your bed, consider getting outside and using nature to awaken your heart.

#### From the Pastor's Desk

**Sensate:** The best avenues for some believers to commune with God are the five senses: taste, touch, hearing, seeing, and even smelling... sensates become spiritually attuned when their senses are brought into play. Majestic music, symbolic architecture, outstanding art, or the sensory experience of communion are dear friends and powerful spiritual aids.

**Traditionalist:** These believers appreciate the role of ritual, which builds on the power of reinforced behavior. There is something profound to them in worshipping God according to set patterns—their own, or history's. They may organize their life around scheduled times of prayer and may even choose to carefully observe the Christian calendar, aligning themselves with centuries of faith... for the traditionalist, familiar patterns of worship can function like a high-powered battery ushering them into a delightful sense of God's presence.

**Ascetic:** When you think of an ascetic, think of a monk or nun. Ascetics meet God internally... they prefer to shut out the world and meet God in solitude and austerity. For them, the best environment for personal worship is silence, without any noisy or colorful stimulants. Accordingly, ascetics usually need to get alone on a regular basis. They may prefer solitary retreats, or at least a quiet place with a rather orderly environment.

Activists love to meet God in the vortex of confrontation. They want to fight God's battles... They may take a political bent or adopt an evangelistic emphasis, but what marks them as an activist is that they feel most alive spiritually when they are in the midst of God's active (often confrontational) work. That's when God seems most real, most immanent, and most exciting.

**Caregivers** love God by loving others. Providing care and meeting needs in Jesus' name spiritually energizes them and draws them ever closer to the Lord... Caregiving extends beyond nursing sick people; it could include fixing a widow's car, serving as a volunteer firefighter, or researching a cure for a disease... To a caregiver, God seems nearest when they are looking at him through the eyes of a sick child or hurting friend.

**Enthusiast** loves the excitement and celebration of their faith... Enthusiasts don't want to just know Scriptural concepts, they want to experience and be moved by them. Their exuberance tends to lead them to embrace things like dancing, music, drawing, singing, and other creative forms of worship. Whereas the traditionalist is comforted by routine, the enthusiast wakes up hoping that God will move in a fresh way that they've never seen Him move in before.

**Contemplatives** are marked by an emotional attachment and even abandonment to God... Contemplatives enjoy doing the things that couples like to do: demonstrating their love for God through secret acts of devotion, giving gifts to God like the gift of a poem, or an anonymous act of charity. They often favor the discipline of journal writing, where they can explore their heart's devotion.

Intellectual: In this context, "intellectual" doesn't necessarily mean "smart," but rather, a heart that is most often awakened when they understand new concepts about God. Their minds are very active, and new intellectual understanding literally births affection; it creates respect for the creator, which leads to worship... The more they understand about truth and God's universe, the more in awe of God—and therefore in love with Him—they become.

Candace Adams offered two additional pathways: Relationalists (who connect with God by connecting with other people) and Creativists (who connect with God by making art). As part of her workshop, participants fill out a questionnaire to see which is our primary pathway. Interestingly, there were three spiritual pathways that I scored high on. Can you figure out which? More importantly, how do you connect with God?

If you would like to learn more, I encourage you to read Thomas' Sacred Pathways and/or have a conversation with me.

## Newsletter Article: *"Why Care About OCWM?"* By Mayflower UCC, Minnesota Conference



They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season. Psalm 1:3a

"What is OCWM?" could well be a question in a United Church of Christ trivia contest, a question many of us at Federated might not be able to answer correctly. Acronyms aside, OCWM (Our Church's Wider Mission) is an important part of the covenant which binds individual members, congregations, Conferences, and the National setting together to form the United Church of Christ.

OCWM is the annual contribution congregations make to the UCC, through our local Minnesota Conference, to fund all the ways we strive together to make a more just world for all. OCWM dollars fund the wide range of resources and services that undergird the ministry we do together at Federated from providing the foundation for the search and call process that brings us our clergy leaders to nourishing and eventually authorizing our members preparing for ordained ministry, from developing and making available a wide variety of resources for justice work and faith formation to providing training and support for those using the resources, from raising up prophetic voices on the state and national level to facilitating structures and alliances that amplify the justice work of Federated's members.

As a congregation rich in resources, both financial and human, Federated could find it easy to minimize its relation to the wider church and be a beacon on our own little hill, but by maintaining a strong commitment to the UCC, both by strong support of OCWM and by the efforts of individual Federated members actively engaged in wider church ministries, Federated honors its covenant. With the assistance of OCWM, members of the UCC gave scholarships to 32 theological and medical students in China and Africa, offered 87 mission trips within the USA (attended by 3,354 volunteers), developed the White Privilege: Lets Talk curriculum that was downloaded 3,475 times from the UCC website, endorsed and credentialed 55 military chaplains, provided micro-loans in Africa that assisted 350 families and so much more. OCWM reflects the wisdom that "In isolation, no single UCC congregation can be the church the world needs today. To be that world-changing church, we work together through Our Church's Wider Mission to support and inspire each other."

Other special offerings (Neighbors in Need, One Great Hour of Sharing, Strengthen the Church, The Christmas Fund) provide opportunities for individual members to contribute to the work of the wider UCC and its ecumenical partners, OCWM is the vehicle for Federated as a congregation to live out its covenantal promise of support. So when you see OCWM as a line item in Federated's budget, rejoice both because you know what OCWM is and, more importantly, because you belong, through Federated, to a much larger and more world-changing church, the United Church of Christ.
