### **PASTOR'S REPORT**

I have a love-hate relationship with technology. There is great appreciation for gadgets that make life easier. Yet, there are plenty of times when devices do not work as they're supposed to. Some of you may remember the "blue screen of death" on computers; it was when the Windows operating system crashed, and important work might be lost. Despite frustrations, I am thankful for technological advances that make it easier to work and play. It is a lot more enjoyable to write this on a computer word processor than on a typewriter (I still remember using a manual typewriter for my high school papers).

My current love-hate feeling is toward Zoom meetings (which allows video conferencing over internet). I appreciate being able to have face-to-face conversations without spending several hours to drive to a meeting location; I just turn on my computer (or smartphone) and click a link. But I am realizing limitations of Zoom. It does not work well for some meetings.

Recently, I attended a hybrid (both online and in-person format) annual meeting for one of our denominations. While I thought of attending in-person, it was more feasible to join online. So, I had three days of Zoom meetings that were not enjoyable. There were sound problems for several meetings. I realized how physically tiring it gets trying to listen when there is poor audio. The following week, I was supposed to attend a pastors' retreat. Due to low registration, the four days of retreat was changed to two days of workshops on Zoom. Sound was not a problem with this event, but I was "Zoom-ed out" by then.

These recent experiences were good learning lessons. Whether we like it or not, many churches have become much more hybrid. Even before COVID-19 pandemic, our church was using technology to record worship services for local broadcast and online viewing. When we could not gather in-person, we developed our online ministry to include live streaming of Sunday worship services. Now, there are several options for worship participation: come to the sanctuary on Thursday/Sunday, join the online community for live streaming on Facebook/YouTube, or watch recorded services any time on our church website.

Although my personal preference is to see people in-person, I think it is wonderful to have people connect with us online. Apostle Paul writing to the church in Corinth said, "When you meet together in the name of our Lord Jesus, I'll be present in spirit with the power of our Lord Jesus" (1 Corinthians 5:4). While Paul did not have worries of whether there will be a fast internet connection, powerful computers and camera or even consistent electricity, he believed that the Holy Spirit can bring people together. And we are blessed to have technology to connect with one another. Here are a few of our technological resources:

- Our church website has been updated with links to Facebook and YouTube for live streaming along with previously recorded services on Vimeo. If you cannot join us in-person, then please join us online. When you are out of town (or maybe even out of the country), you can still join us. There may be Sundays when you're having a rough morning and don't feel like getting out of your pajamas; you are welcome to join us online. Please let us know if there is anything our staff can do to improve the online worship experience.
- I recently set up a computer for one of our church members to view worship services without home internet. Video files were copied onto the hard drive for on-demand viewing. I am also helping another church member to watch our services via DVD on their home TV. If you are not able to physically attend or view our worship services online, please contact our church office and we will try to find a solution.
- For anyone who has had difficulty hearing in our sanctuary, I am excited to share that we will install a new sound system. There have been numerous comments that it is easier to hear the service at home than in our sanctuary. My hope is that the new sanctuary sound system will sound just as good (if not better) than a home audio system.

Technology is a tool. While it is far from perfect, I am thankful for technology to connect as a congregation (I was delighted to learn that word "congregate" comes from "con-" <together> + "gregare" <a flock>). Hopefully, technology can help us to be a flock together.

### **RESCUE MISSION MEALS**

Each month, on the second Friday, Federated Church provides a meal for the Columbus Rescue Mission. The Mission would like to have meat, potatoes or bread, and a vegetable. Dessert is fine, but not necessary. Presently, the Rescue Mission is housed at 1471 25<sup>th</sup> Avenue, with no idea yet when they will move to their new facility, the former Mory's Haven.

Meals are served at 5:30 for women and 6:00 for men. The person/people bringing the meal are most welcome to stay and eat with the residents. If you would like to take a meal early, you may take it to the office on the east side of the building with instructions on how to bake it, etc. Otherwise, take the meal about 5:00 so it can be served at 5:30. Please take it to the side door on the east side of the building.

Plan for 20-25 people, and since this is a large number, it is best if two or three folks go together. Some meal suggestions are: pizza, tacos, lasagna, pulled pork or other sandwiches, chicken or beef casseroles, sloppy joes, soup, etc. If you would like to provide dessert, ice cream is always good, as well as brownies, cookies, cake, etc. Thanks for being part of this important ministry.

### **DECODING THE LITURGICAL COLOR SCHEME**

**Green = Presence** During the majority of the church year, which is commonly called "ordinary time", the color that you will find is green. Because the color green is so often associated with life, the use of green during the seasons and the times when there is "nothing special" going on in the life of the church (no big festivals or holidays) reminds us that God is present among us, breathing life into us and into our church.

**Purple = Preparation** Purple is the color that is used during our seasons of preparation: Advent and Lent. During both of the seasons (the four Sundays before Christmas and the 40 days before Easter, respectively), we are to dedicate ourselves for the preparation of our hearts and minds for welcoming Christ. Purple is also the traditional color of royalty, and so some give nod to this as a reason why we use purple during these seasons.
