* Salt was once used as currency. During the Roman Empire and the Middle Ages, salt was a valuable commodity because it could preserve food. People would use salt as a method of trade and currency and would lick salt blocks to make sure they were real.

* Pouring salt into shoes and letting it sit overnight can help absorb excess moisture and odors.

* Sleep: Salt is a natural hypnotic that can help regulate sleep If you think that information is interesting, just wait till you come to class! Our structure is: one week we show an interesting video followed by discussion; the next week we discuss current news events (no political discussion, though!) and how these events relate to the Bible.

COLUMBUS RESCUE MISSION

The Columbus Rescue Mission is located at the old Mory's Haven building. Federated has provided meals once a month to the mission for a long time, the second Friday of the month. I recently visited with Chaplain Dave Porter, who has been at the mission for nineteen years, to clarify some information and to answer questions that people may have.

At the present time there are no facilities for women/families but this area is under construction. When completed, the Rescue Mission can house up to 75 people.

Residents living in the mission have three weeks to find a job, and they may then stay for three months so that they can save money and honor deadlines. There are currently 2000 jobs available in Platte county. Residents are required to attend church weekly, to stay sober, to respect each other and treat each other with dignity and care.

While most of the residents are short term, there is a NEW LIFE program in which guests can stay up to a year. This is similar to a rehab program. The goal of this program, as well as all the other programs at the mission is to give the gospel, employment, and independent living.

The number of meals asked for is always twenty five. Dave Porter explained that even though there are not always that number in residence, that amount of food is used for lunches the next day, and also since people come in off the street for meals, the mission is never sure of the number to be fed on any given day.

Eighty percent of the meals are brought in by churches and other organizations. I asked if there were any foods that were preferred, and Chaplain Porter said that anything is welcome. I also asked if they often had dessert, and he said 80% of the time they do. Volunteers often bring in milk, and coffee is always welcome. The folks in the NEW LIFE program help prepare the food and clean up.

This year, our Social Concerns and Missions committee is suggesting that instead of partnering with the person/persons you normally partner with to take a meal to the Rescue Mission, how about asking someone else to help you with this? Two or three people can get together, divide up the meal, and therefore involve new people who may be hesitant to bring a meal for 25 people! Working together is always a good way to develop friendships or strengthen existing friendships.

The Rescue mission does not give up on people. Chaplain Dave Porter said that their programs allow people to see there is a different way, with the grace of God. Federated Church is a part of this important ministry.

For the year of 2024, we have received donations equaling \$1,890.00!

As of August 31st, we have helped sixteen people with fuel, one member with food, one person with rental assistance, one member with an anxiety vest, and donated \$350 to the Brian Marker Benefit that was held in January, for a total of \$828.92.
